PFDW 80TH ANNUAL CONVENTION ALLENTOWN PA JUNE 21-24

The Pennsylvania Federation of Democratic Women celebrated its 80th Anniversary from June 21 to 24 at the Crowne Plaza Hotel in Allentown. The theme of the convention was "All Roads Lead to the White House." We were pleased this year that Pennsylvania Cable Network (PCN) chose to televise our convention events and seminars, and to show them many times across the state.

Our opening night's theme was "All Local Roads Lead to the White House." Approximately 150 convention attendees were hosted by Allentown Mayor Ed Pawlowski and other local elected officials at a welcoming reception at the Allentown Brew Works. Guests that evening were welcomed by Easton City Council President Sandi Vulcano, PFDW President Dr. Michele Bortner, Senator Lisa Boscola, Allentown City Councilmember Mike D'Amore, and Lehigh County Democratic Chair Rick Daugherty. In addition to the many local officials attending, the inspirational keynote address was given by PA Auditor General Jack Wagner. Later that evening, the PFDW held its first annual pajama party.

Friday's luncheon speakers included Lehigh County Executive Don Cunningham and State Senator Shirley Kitchen. Linda Minger, Salisbury Township Treasurer, presided at this event. Bethlehem City Treasurer Kaija Farber, Chair of the Regional Directors, introduced each Director following the luncheon. The afternoon seminar was "The Climate Project (An Inconvenient Truth)" presented by Lance Simmens, one of Al Gore's 1000 trainers on global warming. It was an informative and very timely presentation.

On Friday night, we celebrated “All State Roads Lead to the White House” and, what better way to keep Pennsylvania Democratic than to hold a “blue” dinner! We dressed in blue, the decorations and even the wine were blue! The evening began with a reception hosted by our main speaker that evening, our Lieutenant Governor Catherine Baker Knoll. Also speaking were Senator Connie Williams and Representative Bob Freeman.

Following our annual Walkathon on Saturday morning, several outstanding workshops included “Politics and Faith”, a panel discussion led by Allentown Mayor Ed Pawlowski, “Reinvigorating or Forming a Local Women’s Democratic Club” facilitated by Jo Ann Nardelli, and a presentation by DNC representative Fadia Halma titled “Organizing the Women’s Vote.”

Six outstanding young Democratic women were awarded \$1,000 scholarships at Saturday’s luncheon, where speakers included Jennifer Mann, member of the PA House of Representatives and Congressman Joseph Sestak. Congressman Sestak presented an astute update on events currently transpiring in Washington.

The elegant Saturday evening reception, coordinated by Siobhan “Sam” Bennett, candidate for Congress in the 15th Congressional District along with PFDW supporters from the Lehigh Valley and across the state, was a great beginning to our banquet, “All National Roads Lead to the White House.” It also served as a celebration of the 80th anniversary of the PFDW, for which the traditional theme is diamonds and lace. Speakers that evening included four statewide Judicial candidates: Judge Ron Folino and Christine Donohue for Superior Court, and Judges Debra Todd and Seamus McCaffrey for Supreme Court.

The convention concluded on Sunday morning with Installation of the Federation’s new officers and a Farewell Brunch.

CATHERINE BAKER’S KNOLL’S REMARKS TO PFDW CONVENTION – “ALL ROADS LEAD TO THE WHITE HOUSE”

What an amazing assembly of determination this is!

I get the distinct impression that if it’s true that all roads lead to the White House, then there is some major highway construction underway here in Allentown this weekend.

And make no mistake – the engineering report is in – the on-ramp to the superhighway called “Victory” is in Pennsylvania.

I find it more than coincidental that the road we intend to travel carries the name “Pennsylvania” – as in Pennsylvania Avenue. It’s a 500-day trip, and this time women have made it clear that we will not settle for being passengers.

We expect to be in the driver’s seat.

We have the voices. We have the votes.

- First, between here and the West Wing, there are sure to be some political potholes. Anticipating them; avoiding them; reducing them to mere speedbumps – can make the trip go smoothly.
- Second, there will be detours. We know the opposition will create some. Let’s make sure we don’t create any of our own. That’s why we have a map, a campaign plan, a platform on which we can stand.
- Third, this is a toll highway. We know that. And the toll keeps getting raised every four years. That’s okay. Democrats will NOT come up short on fundraising. The price of giving America the kind of presidential leadership it needs is a price worth paying.
- Fourth, remember, please, there will be no shortcuts. Success in 2008 has hard work written all over it. So, I caution you not to shop for your inaugural gown or your designer pumps too early. First, we need you to get your blue jeans and sneakers out of your closet, because they will be more comfortable as you go door-to-door, neighborhood-to-neighborhood, county-to-county, throughout Pennsylvania.

So, fasten your seat belts, and pay attention to the road signs ahead, for there are road conditions to be aware of:

Democratic women of Pennsylvania, the way to pack for this trip is to use your “3-C” luggage. That’s “C” as in conscience, confidence, and commitment.

Conscience, because if you don’t bring it with you, you may forget how critical the 2008 election really is.

Confidence, because all god trips start with the unwavering belief that we’ll get to where we’re planning to go.

And commitment, because making history is a whole lot better than making excuses.

If we all do this – AND WE WILL – I promise you that we won’t have to worry about reading the bumper sticker on the car ahead of us – because there will be no car ahead of us!

I’m proud to be a part of what’s happening here this weekend. Let’s make it happen. Pennsylvania women can do that!

Order of Protocol For a Club Meeting

Protocol in relation to meetings has come to mean the system that governs the relative importance of persons. It has to do with their rank in speaking, in their location at table or in a reception line, and their recognition and introduction. Protocol embodies the courtesies that should be extended persons of prominence before and at meetings.

The guest of honor should be:

- Invited as far ahead of a meeting as possible; advised of the function of the meeting and their function; given an outline of the program and a brief statement of the organization.
- Advised of the date of the hotel reservations along with name, address and phone number of the hotel. Reservations are made by the organization for the guest. A local host is assigned to meet, greet, and transport the guest.
- Advised of climate and type of dress for event.
- Advised of time to speak, how long to speak and expected size of audience

It is customary that all expenses of guest speakers be paid by the organization extending the invitation unless other arrangements are made in advance. Business, announcements and introductions should be limited so as not to delay the guest speaker.

The Presiding officer should thank the guest speaker publicly before adjourning. A note of thanks should be sent to the guest promptly.

Protocol in seating at a Club Meeting:

Presiding officer in the center; the guest speaker to the right of presiding officer. The program chair or person to introduce the speaker to the left of presiding officer. The other guests at the head table are seated according to rank. Place cards help.

Supreme Court Justice Candidates

In the upcoming election Pennsylvania Voter's will be electing two Supreme Court Justices and three Superior Court Justices. We also have the chance of making Pennsylvania History by electing the first female Supreme Justice in Pennsylvania, so don't forget to get out and vote!!!

The Honorable Debra McCloskey Todd, who formerly served on the Executive Board of the PFDW and is the 2007 Elected Woman of the Year Honoree. Judge Todd was born and raised in Pennsylvania. She received her law degree from the University of Pittsburgh and post-doctorate L.L.M. Degree in the Judicial Process from the University of Virginia. After 18 years as a Trial Attorney she was elected Judge of the Pennsylvania Superior Court, a position she has held for seven years. The other candidate is **the Honorable Seamus McCaffery**, who has already given 35 years to public service. Born in Belfast, Ireland he moved to the United States when he was 5 years old. He has a combined 39 years serving his country from a private in the Marines to his current position as an Air Force Reserve Colonel. He worked for 20 years as a Police Officer, while going to school and earning a Law Degree from Temple University. She was a volunteer for many local charities, and bought tickets to Democratic functions to donate to those who could not afford them when she could no longer attend herself. When honored by the Democratic Women in 1997, she wrote: "One of about a million of my favorite sayings is: Everyone is our brother, no one goes the road alone. All that you put into the lives of others, comes back into your own", then added: "Maybe not an exact quote but something I always believed in."

Phyllis Hanobic, of Renovo, Clinton County, died on March 15, 2007 at the age of 81. She was a past Democratic Chair of Clinton County and President of the Lady Bird Democratic Women's Club. Unable to attend the 2006 PFDW Convention in Williamsport, she and the Lady Birds made favors for the event. In her community, she was active in planning the annual Flaming Foliage celebration, the Midget League, and bringing musical groups to the area. A newspaper article at the time of her death cited her many contributions to the community and referred to her as the "Mother of Renovo".
